Milo Res is a man who digs rocks and over the past four years he has applied both his love of geology and his expertise to defining just how much iron ore is in the ground at our Central Eyre Iron Project.

As Iron Road's Geology Manager, Milo led the team that helped achieve 155km of drilling to establish the grade and size of the 3.7 billion tonne magnetite deposit near Warrambo.

Now his work here is done and he will be sorely missed.

With the release of the definitive feasibility study, which proved up the investment case for the planned mine, port and rail link, Iron Road is moving from the technical phase to the financing phase of the project.

And that means Milo and a few of the other technical staff are coming to the end of their time with Iron Road.

One of Milo's biggest challenges was ensuring that as data was gathered in the feasibility study, he and his team minimised their impact on the farmland where they worked.

"We set strict operating criteria and whenever possible timed our access to limit any disturbance to the landowners and their paddocks," he said.

During most of his time with the company Milo commuted to Adelaide but now, instead of travelling halfway across the continent every week, he will be able to spend more time with his wife and two children in Perth.

Milo is sad to be coming to the end of his journey with Iron Road and will miss the many friends he made both in Adelaide and on the Eyre Peninsula.
